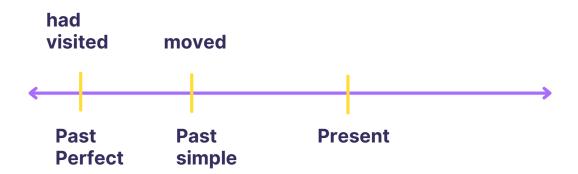




We use the **past perfect** to show that **one past action happened before another past action**. We form the past perfect by conjugating the auxiliary verb *have* to the past simple *had*.

Let's look at some examples.

Jack and Amanda **had visited** Italy every summer before they **moved** there.



The past perfect tells you which action happened first.

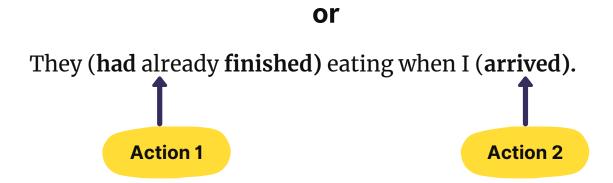
**1st action** Jack and Amanda visit Italy

**2nd action** Jack and Amanda move to Italy

You can change the order of the sentence but the past perfect still happens first.



When I (arrived) to the restaurant they (had already finished) eating.



The past perfect is also used in the third conditional to talk about an unreal past action with an imagined result.

## **Examples:**

- If I had studied for the exam, I would have passed.
- If I hadn't cut my hair, it would have been longer.
- If I had known you were in town, I would have met with you.

## The construction of the past perfect

In the affirmative, the past perfect is formed by using subject + had + past participle. To make a question, we put the *auxiliary* verb before the *subject*.

## subject + had + past participle

| I<br>you<br>we<br>they<br>he<br>she | had<br>hadn't | eaten. |
|-------------------------------------|---------------|--------|
| it                                  |               |        |

had + subject + past participle

|     | l<br>you<br>we          |        |
|-----|-------------------------|--------|
| Had | they<br>he<br>she<br>it | eaten? |

## **Contractions**

Contract the **subject** and the auxiliary verb in **positive sentences**.

| l had                       | l'd                   |
|-----------------------------|-----------------------|
| You had                     | You'd                 |
| He had<br>She had<br>It had | He'd<br>She'd<br>It'd |
| We had                      | We'd                  |
| They had                    | They'd                |

She'd been to that restaurant before.

He'd lived there for five years.

In **negative sentences**, we contract the auxiliary verb and "not".

I hadn't seen the movie before.

He hadn't lived there for five years.

They hadn't visited many countries.
